### **Course Description**

This course is an introductory course to psychology which aims to provide students with foundational knowledge on the basis of human behaviour, emotions and personality. The historical foundations of studying human behaviour is explored in this topic and are compared with the contemporary theories. Some key topics covered include the social influences on behaviour, personality theories and the physiological bases of human behaviour including the types of motivations driving certain actions. These theories and concepts are drawn from psychology and substantiated by science. Students also learn the different methods used for physiological inquiries and how they are applied in practical scenarios.
